

INFORMATION FOR AUTHORS

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Manuscripts must be submitted in triplicate and should conform to the Uniform Requirements for Manuscripts Submitted to Biomedical Journals (*N Engl J Med* 1997;336:309–15). The manuscript text should be double-spaced throughout. The Title page, Abstract, Body Text, Acknowledgments, References, Legends, Tables and Figures should appear in that order on separate sheets of paper. Define all abbreviations at first appearance, and avoid their use in the title and abstract. Use generic names of drugs. Once a manuscript has been accepted, it should be submitted on a virus-free 3.5-inch computer disc or a compact disc as a text file or Microsoft Word file.

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The title page should include a brief and specific Title, full names and affiliations of each author, and an address, telephone number, facsimile number and E-mail address of the corresponding author. Acknowledgment of grant support should be cited. A short Running Title (40 characters or less) should be provided. Where applicable, a Chinese title and Chinese authors' names should appear in Chinese characters below the English title.

Abstract

A concise description (not more than 250 words) of the Purpose or Background, Methods, Results and Conclusions is required. Up to 3–6 Key Words or phrases for subject indexing should be provided below the abstract. Where applicable, a Chinese translation of the abstract should be also included.

Body Text

The text of Original Articles should be divided into Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results and Discussion sections. Other article types may use other formats as described below. Acknowledgments are typed at the end of the text before references.

Tables and Illustrations

All tables should be cited, by number, in the text. Each table should have a brief informative title. Define all abbreviations used and provide any other relevant information (e.g., statistical significance) as a footnote. Place each table on a separate page.

Two sets of illustrations must be submitted and enclosed in a separate envelope. Label the back of each figure with the title of the article and an arrow indicating the top of the figure. Figure legends should appear on a separate sheet of paper and should be brief, providing sufficient description for figure interpretation. Number figures in the order in which they are mentioned in the text. Photographs and drawings should be unmounted, glossy prints, 5"×7" in size. Internal scale markers on photographs are desirable.

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- Supply 3 to 6 key words or phases for subject indexing.

References

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 - Abbreviate titles of medical periodicals conforming to those used in Index Medicus.
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 - Cite up to four authors in a reference. If there are more than four authors, cite the first three and insert et al.

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- Cite tables in order of appearance in the text.
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
